Hot Hand Blues Band

A very cool show at Parlor City Pub

¬ aster Sunday, April 4, the Hot Hand ■ Blues Band gave a very cool perfor-■ mance at Parlor City in Cedar Rapids. A good-sized crowd showed up to hear the music even though it was a holiday.

Band members include Ron DeWitte on guitar and vocals, Frank Zahorik on harmonica and vocals, Tim Razor on bass and vocals, and Butch O'Connell on drums. The band plays a combination of blues, soul and rock standards, with a touch of cowboy blues thrown in for some extra spice.

DeWitte, veteran guitar player and Iowa Music Hall of Famer, always gives a superb performance on his instrument. His smooth vocals on songs like "Georgia," "You'll Never Find Another Love Like Mine," and "Stand By Me" are as good as you'll hear anywhere on any stage.

Frank Zahorik, of Lisbon, plays a mean blues harp and also has an excellent voice. He took lead vocal duties on songs like "Caldonia" and Hank, Jr.'s "Family Tradition." Zahorik also played harmonica and interchanged leads with

Tim Razor added to the vocal mix with his raspy blues renditions of "Sweet Home Chicago" and "Papa's Got A Brand New Bag." Tim plays bass with authority and high energy--a fun guy to watch as he always enjoys the beat.

Then there's local favorite Butch O'Connell on drums who seems to be able to play any genre of music with crisp rhythm and polished experience. The guy could play drums for any

Probably my favorite tune for the evening was a slow, haunting five-minute version of "Ghost Riders In the Sky" with Frank Zahorik taking lead vocal and Ron DeWitte laying down those deep guitar notes that remind one of Wyoming and Montana vistas. It was truly a classic rendition of a classic cowboy blues song.

The Hot Hand Blues Band is most active in the summer. As with most musicians in this area, each is a member of other musical groups and enjoys playing a variety of musical styles.

Talking with DeWitte during a break, he mentioned that he and his wife, singer Lynne Rothrock, spent much of the winter on the cruise ship musical circuit. Traveling thousands of miles on the ocean to all parts of the world, he said the food was good and the pay was excellent for playing just a few times during a week. But though the overall experience was rewarding, sometimes being on board a ship for so many days was confining. He seemed to be glad to be back in Iowa and playing music on

Parlor City continues to sign and feature excellent bands. The performance by the Hot Hand Blues Band certainly added to this most welcome trend.



Style Vs. Affectation

We all remember Johnny Lang as one of the best in a generation of "Mini Jimis" a few years ago. But it's "Mini Jimi" no more with Johnny Lang at what seems to be the peak of his game. He's got the licks and the chops and his songs are first rate. Not really a celebratory set, this recording features music dealing with subjects that have taken some thought. It's paced well and the CD recording is nicely done. He's developed an individual hard-edged blues/rock crossover sound with backing from a fine professional band mostly from the Twin Cities. He sings in tune and the harmonies are extra nice and his vocal sound is really intense – which gets me to part 2.

Johnny Lang's singing begs the question: When does style become affectation? What do I mean by that? That his vocals never hold still & settle in – busy – over the top - and after a while it wears me out to listen to him. I've had the same complaint with other artists in all genres but in the blues: Joe Louis Walker & Candye Kane come to mind – where the artists' individual vocal sound distracts from the performance. Am I getting old or do I get an "Amen" from the congregation?

Style is a distinctive manner of expression. Affectation is speech or conduct not natural to one's self. Where is the line between an artists' ability to express themselves and a human vocal sound that is almost freakish? Answering that question is the responsibility of the listener.

While you're pondering that, enjoy a butt-kicking live set recorded at one of the world's hallowed halls.

Doug Roberson deftly handled the guitar and bass guitar parts while Paul Kresowik provided spirited rhythm on drums. It was great to hear Nate Basinger on keyboards again with his inventive Hammond B-3 riffs and solos.

Sarah Cram and Kathy Ruestow, the Diplomettes, were obviously having a joyful time singing together again. From the opening vocal da-oops of "I'm Blue (The Gong Gong Song)" through "Nobody's Gonna Stand In My Way!" and "I'm Already Gone" to the personal and meaningful "Soul Connection," the two female

Flock of Funk groove it up at Parlor City Pub

Tt was standing room only by the second set of Flock of Funk's **L**performance at Parlor City on April 11. Playing lots of Motown, soul, and rhythm and blues, this local area band brought dancers close to the front of the stage and enthusiastic appreciation from the listening audience

Billy Davis on saxophone and lead vocals is perhaps the focus of the music show. But all the band members sing well and represent some of the best instrumental talent in the region.

Denny Ketelson plays Hammond B-3 and synth, Dennis McMurrin is on guitar, Tim Razor plays bass, and Bruce Chadima is on drums.

With total talent like that in one group, Flock of Funk really rocked the joint and made a warm, Spring Sunday evening even more pleasant.

Two songs stand out as performance gems in my recollection. A long, extended version (instrumental only) of "When A Man Loves A Woman" gave Davis a chance to play his saxophone with a smooth and sublime delivery that was simply gorgeous. Interwoven with great solos by Mc-Murrin on guitar and Ketelson on key-

boards, the old Percy Sledge standard was transformed into a tune of beauty.

The other gem was an extended version of the Spinners' classic "I'll Be Around," with Billy Davis crooning lead vocals that had many in the audience singing along and remembering old romances.

Flock of Funk only performs publicly about once a month. Billing themselves as "The Ultimate Party Band," they have upcoming shows this summer and fall at Parlor City and the Chrome

This group definitely knows how to offer pleasing entertainment!
