Blues On Grand set to close October 23- the LAST day

This news has been out there for a bit, but I wanted to hold off on reporting until I heard the news from Jeff Wagner's own mouth. Unfortunately, it's true, Blues on Grand will be closing its doors in October.

Wagner was pretty straight forward when asked why: "Lack of attendance." Wagner set the date because too often blues bands will be out on the road and not find out the club theyr'e supposed to play at has been closed until they get to the door. He didn't want to leave touring acts hanging, so he got the word out early.


The bar's last day is set to be Oct. 23 with a closing bash. Wagner is still firming up the details, and I'll pass them along once he has it all figured out.

This will be a big blow to not only the local music scene, but also the national scene. Fewer venues means it's harder for touring musicians to get a coveted weekend slot. Fewer slots mean bands can't fill dates on a tour. Blues on Grand being closed means one less place for bands to stop on their way to Chicago, Omaha, Minneapolis or Kansas City.

Okay, enough of a downer. You want good blues in the area? Check out some of the shows Blues on Grand is hosting in the next two months. Here's the schedule of acts. Keep updated on the Central Iowa Blues Society, which seems to have redesigned its site in the last few weeks.

The CIBS is hosting the 2010 Iowa Blues Challenge Solo/Duo contest Sept. 12 at Blues on Grand. Gary "Cookie" Anderson, The Lew & Brad Band, Bodley & Cantrell, Two Pony Blues Band, Joel Baker, The Most Handsome Duo in the World, Soulful Security Duo and Bebad and the Bear perform. The winning act gets to compete in the 2011 International Blues Challenge in Memphis. Doors open at 1 p.m., admission is \$7 (\$6 for Blues Society members).

MISSISSIPPI BLUES TRAIL STRETCHES TO WISCONSIN

112th marker dedicated on site of Paramount Records

On Saturday, September 18 at 3:30pm, the 112th Mississippi Blues Trail marker will be dedicated in Lime Kiln Park in Grafton, Wisconsin, near the former site of Paramount Records.

During the late 1920s and early 1930s, the Paramont Records label recorded many pioneering artists from Mississippi, including Charley Patton, Son House, Tommy Johnson, Skip James, Gus Cannon, Henry Townsend, the Mississippi Sheiks, Willie Brown, the Graves Brothers and others. This is the seventh marker dedicated outside of the state, and like the others, it demonstrates the wide reach and influence of Mis-

"Paramount Records was instrumental in bringing Mississippi blues to the world," Gov. Haley Barbour said. "Some of our state's greatest musical legends traveled to Wisconsin to get their start in the music industry. Mississippi may be the birthplace of America's music, however, partners in states across this country have been invaluable in spreading the sound."

The marker is being placed in tandem with the Fifth Annual Paramount Blues Festival. During the weekend, Tommy Johnson and Big Bill Broonzy will be honored on Grafton's Paramount Walk of Fame. Also on Saturday, Johnson's legacy will be celebrated with the Fifth Annual Tommy Johnson Blues Festival at the Cooper's Down Racetrack in Terry, Miss.

Paramount Records was launched in 1917 by its parent company, the Wisconsin Chair Company, which also produced phonographs and phonograph cabinets. The label began recording blues artists in 1922, initially concentrating on female stars of the vaudeville circuit including Ma Rainey. By the mid-1920s, it was the home of leading male artists including Texas' Blind Lemon Jefferson. In the late 1920s, Paramount began utilizing field agents, including Jackson, Miss., furniture and music store owner H.C. Speir, to locate talent across the South.

Among the artists that Speir located in Mississippi was Charley Patton, one of the founders of the Delta Blues, who recorded over forty songs for Paramount. Other Mississippi-born artists who recorded for the label include: Tommy Johnson, the most influential artist in the Greater Jackson area; Memphis jug band pioneer Gus Cannon; Henry Townsend, a leading bluesman in St. Louis; Bentonia's Skip James, one of the most distinctive stylists of early blues; and Son House, who was the mentor of both Robert Johnson and Muddy Waters.

Many of these recordings were made between 1929, when Paramount opened a studio in Grafton, and 1932, when low record sales resulting from the Depression forced Paramount to close its doors. Over the ensuing decades, however, historians and record collectors would hold the Paramount's recordings in the highest esteem.

The Mississippi Blues Trail is a museum without walls taking visitors on a musical history journey through Mississippi. The trail started with the first official marker in Holly Ridge, the resting place of the blues guitarist Charley Patton. The trail winds its way to sites honoring B.B. King, Muddy Waters, Son House and more.

Levee Town in town Kansas City blues comes to Checkers

Tf you read John "Big Mo" Heim's "Pick of the Month" in the Sep-Lember issue of the LCBS Bluespaper, you know that he gave the newest CD by Kansas-based blues band Levee Town (the self-titled "Levee Town") a great review and ended by saying that he hoped they would come around here sometime. A very prophetic statement as there they were two weeks later on the stage at Checkers Tavern in CR. Their live show includes all the musical elements that Big Mo attributed to their new album of all original material. These guys display a great respect for all blues traditions. During their live performance, you will hear covers

section and Brandon Hudspeth on guitar and Jimmie Meade on harmonica complement each other extremely well. Hudspeth, who wrote most of the songs on the new CD, and Garoutte, who contributed 4 new songs, trade off on lead vocals with Meade taking the lead on "You Mean", a song that he also wrote for the new CD. All of them contribute backing vocals throughout and the harmonies work very well.

They played a number of songs from their latest CD including "I'm Not Broke", "Three Sides", "Etta" and "Why Why Why", all very strong material that will get your feet tapping. I've always been a big fan of Little Walter, Sonny Boy Williamson (both of them), Junior Wells and James

and originals in a wide range of genres: Kansas blues (of course) along with delta blues, Chicago blues, country blues and jump blues. They played a killer version of Jimi Hendrix' "Little Wing" with Brandon Hudspeth on a hollowbody Gibson, a Cream-inspired version of "Spoonful", a great version of Freddie King's "Hideaway" as well as a number of other covers that showcased their amazing musicianship and vocals. The blues influences I heard throughout the night included Muddy Waters, Little Walter, Freddie King, Jimmy Reed and the list goes on.

Jacque Garoutte on bass and Jan Faircloth on drums are a solid rhythm Cotton so I especially enjoyed the very authentic blues sound from Meade's harmonica. Their sense of humor comes out in their live performance with songs like "All Over But The Paperwork" (about divorce) as well as a fun version of "Yakety Sax", the theme song to the Benny Hill show translated to guitar. These guys are a lot of fun to see live with great sound and great energy. A big "Thank You" to Checkers for bringing them to town! I hope they get back to this area sometime soon. If they do, I know I will be there and, if you are a blues fan, do yourself a favor and check them out. You won't be disappointed!



Craig Erickson "New Earth Blues"

Grooveyard Records

Featuring nine original songs, three covers, and a hidden "Jam Session" track, New Earth Blues, the newest album from Craig Erickson, is funky, heady and psychedelic at times.

Fans of Chris Whitley should really enjoy "Indian Summer", an exceptional cover from Whitley's 1998 album, Dirt Floor. Also covered on this album, are Free's "Be My Friend", and "World Keeps on Turning" by Fleetwood Mac.

A slower, somber ballad, "Drowning Down Here", is beautifully constructed and at times reminiscent of Big Brother and the Holding Company's version of "Summertime". as his quitar seems to just break down and cry. My two favorites tracks from New Earth Blues are "Political World" and 'Titanic Planet". "Political World" is pure Seventies blues-rock, but with more poignant lyrics. However, "Titanic Planet", stands out as one of the best new songs I have heard this year. I absolutely love it. It's got such a captivating groove to it, I often listen to this song multiple times in a row. I would love to hear this one live with a full band, stretching it out to at least a ten minute jam. I've had this disc on heavy rotation lately, and it just seems to get better with each listen.

I'd met Mer a few weeks prior and had written her off as a cute, talkative, possibly stoned, airhead. Just the type of girl I'd have been looking for 20 years ago.

Between songs, she made a claim that she could sing a lot of the songs Another band I had formed via a we were playing. "Yeah right," was my connection on craigslist. The singer first thought. Over the years I've encountered so many people who think they can sing, (or play harmonica) well, that I'm naturally a bit skeptical when I hear such claims. But, since it was a rehearsal, and since her boyfriend was playing bass, I decided to humor her singer when she needs a substitute and give her five minutes on the mic. I was pleasantly surprised to say the I got called once as a last minute fill least. Even more surprising to me was the fact that no one had Mer in a gigging band already. Once again, time to turn on my faux charisma and convince her to join a band with me. Luckily, rehearsals wherein we played "shuffle" once again it didn't take much convincing, as I've now learned that she is far more serious about music than my initial impression had led me to believe.

The Symbols will be doing our first gig in Denver tomorrow night (Tuesday Sept 14) at Ziggies as the host band for potential and tanked that project in their open jam, so if you're in the Denver area, come on down to listen to us.
