Danielle Nicole *Performs at Campbell Steele Gallery*

A aturday, November 19, singer/ bassist Danielle Nicole gave an exquisite performance to a sold out crowd at Campbell Steele Gallery in Marion, Iowa. Singer/bassist Nicole, previously of the Kansas City band, Trampled Under Foot, is now in command of her own band, consisting of the very talented guitarist Brandon Miller, keyboardist extraordinaire Mike "Shinetop Jr." Sedovic, and the outstanding Jon Faircloth on drums. This troop of musicians is one of the tightest groups I've heard, and hearing them play live is truly an electric experience.



Nicole beautifully performed the tremendous "Give Me Tonight" by Grammy Award winning songwriter and producer Anders Osborne, who also happened to produce Nicole's 2015 Wolf Den album. Their performance of "Starvin' For Love" was both joyous and riveting. Miller tore into some lush slide guitar on their deliciously haunting cover of Son House's "Death Letter Blues."


The first segment of the second set featured Nicole onstage alone, armed with acoustic guitar instead of her bass. She captivated the audience with John Prine's "Angel From Montgomery", and a poignant delivery of Bob Dylan's "Don't Think Twice", before taking on Dolly Parton's "Jolene".

A moment of remembrance for the great soul singer Sharon Jones (May 4, 1956 – November 18, 2016) was taken, as Nicole shared her memories of opening up for Jones at a music festival overseas. This ushered in a most fitting tribute as they broke out the funk in Jones' "Nobody's Baby". Another tribute to a recently fallen musical dignitary was taken later in the evening with a terrific performance of Prince's "Purple Rain". Nicole sang this with intensity and heartfelt emotion as Miller payed a stellar guitar solo.

Although the band played for nearly three hours with just a smidge of a break, it was an evening which no one really wanted to end. This is what the blues is all about.

Take Me High

Take Me High, the fourth album from British blues artist Laurence Jones, is downright spectacular. After being awarded Best European Blues Guitarist in 2015, Jones fines himself nominated again for 2016. Producerextraordinaire, Mike Vernon, (John Mayhall, David Bowie, Eric Clapton, Fleetwood Mac) puts his magic touch on the album, making sure the energy levels remain high on this fabulous recording. Joining Jones is his band composed of bassist, Roger Inniss, drummer, Phil Wilson, with Bob Fridzema on keyboards and Paul Jones on harmonica.

Killer beats and lush keys provide the perfect backdrop for Jones' razor-sharp riffs on "Live It Up", a monster song which crushes everything in its path. From the searing beginning to its exciting climax, "Addicted to Your Love" is drenched with emotion. "Take Me High", stewed in an electric bluesy goodness is dutifully served with true grit and nice tasty helping of slide. It is such a great pleasure to hear Jones let loose on a song, like he does on Stevie Wonder's "Higher Ground". This piece de resistance is ear-candy for the music aficionado.

Ellis Kell 1955-2016

The cancer he was battling was adenocarcinoma of the esophagus. Doctors discovered that his cancer was at stage four and had spread to his lungs and liver. He underwent four weeks of chemotherapy. Kell's life was surrounded by music, for which he carried an obvious passion. He once said "life without music would just be a cruel joke...I think it's the greatest gift we were ever given."

He used his passion and gift for music to reach out to the community and to get him through tough times.

After the tragic passing of his daughter Karlie, Kell and his wife founded the Karlie Rose Music Scholarship Fund to help young musicians follow their dreams.

His family will be posting funeral details as soon as they are finalized.

Arnie Erickson A real guitar hero!

This month we honor the memory of teacher and musician Arnie Erickson who passed away at the age of 90 on November 26, 2016. He devoted his life to teaching music and math, performing jazz guitar and supporting musicians and live music.

Arnie grew up in a musical family of during the Great Depression in the mining town of Grassflat, Pennsylvania but as Arnie himself said "I didn't stay country too long, I was into Duke Ellington by age 12." Per a story about his band in Down Beat magazine, "he didn't start playing until he was 15." A year later he decided that if he thoroughly mastered the guitar he would make lots of money and would really be set. He quit high school and started studying. His brother, Herb, was quoted saying "we thought the kid was nuts. He would practice eight hours a day, seven days a week and would only leave the house for a Saturday night job he played. That went on for four years."

By the age of 22, Arnie was playing guitar with the Max Gordon trio and touring throughout the Midwest. After touring he resumed his education graduating from Lycoming College with honors. He and his wife, Connie, started teaching in Illinois. His son, Craig, said that he came to Cedar Rapids to play on WMT radio and they decided to apply for teaching jobs here. He taught math and special education at Cedar Rapids schools such as Roosevelt and Kennedy and taught guitar to a countless number of students at Hiltbruners and other music stores. His students included the Harris brothers David, Mark and Peter (who played with Bruce Hornsby), Dennis Mc-Murrin, Nick Simmons, not to mention his son Craig and daughter Koreen Brennan. Koreen said of her father "There is something about improvised music that is very, very special. Dad brought this alive for me - the freedom, spontaneity, creativity, the collaborative environment of an improv band."

Arnie was always playing the local

clubs, including the Piccadilly Room at the Roosevelt Hotel, The Tender Trap, country clubs and private parties. Wednesday jazz at the Greek Place on Mt. Vernon Road was magical.

He opened and ran the Music Loft for 30 years, creating a vibrant, diversified familyoriented scene—an environment for musicians to flourish. He did lots of advertising to support the blues. The Music Loft nurtured a social world where lifelong friendships and bands were formed. There are countless people who are grateful for the education, inspiration and live music provided by Arnie Erickson.

Nicholas Simmons wrote; "I remember that play at Washington High School like yesterday, and how he jumped onto the stage, and on one knee did the flamenco stuff. From backstage he played Impossible Dream solo on electric, I never forgot that, and neither did my mom. We went backstage afterwards and I was just blown away to see him in the makeup. He was my first guitar hero!

Mary Stokes Pick Up The Phone - Lakehouse Records

arty Stokes calls the area around Sanibel and Captiva Islands (on Florida's Gulf Coast) home, and it's also where he grew up and has been playing the blues since he was a kid. As a member of the states' many blues societies, The Marty Stokes Band spreads it's blues all over the sunshine state. One would be hard pressed to find a club or festival in Florida where the band has not played. When you think about it, there's something to be said for that - the band is constantly working!


On "Pick Up The Phone", the band consists of: Marty Stokes on vocals, and lead, rhythm, slide & acoustic guitars: Jennifer Mazziotti on tenor and all harmony saxophones; Darryl Best on bass; and Carveth Clauson on drums. Special guests on the project include: John McLanne on B-3 keyboards; Summer Kilgore Mendez on lead and backup vocals; J P Soars on lead and cigar box guitars; and Chris Peet on drums. The album is Marty Stokes' third release, is self-produced and his first on the Lakehouse label. It features thirteen tracks of which nine were penned by Marty.

"Pick Up The Phone", the opening and title track, is the only track on the disc that features just the four members of the band. Basically, this fast paced shuffle is what those of us familiar with the band get to hear on a regular basis - tight and intense rhythm from Darryl and Carveth, with lots of smokin' sax and guitar leads by Jennifer and Marty.

The sixty second scorching guitar work Marty lays down on the intro to "Take A Little Time" immediately had me loving this one. Then shortly afterwards Jennifer blows out a similar scorching riff on her sax and that was it, I was in slow blues heaven. When these two team up on these tandem burning blues leads, it just doesn't get any better. Then again, with Chris Pete (J P. Soars & the Red Hots and Southern Hospitality) and John McLane running your rhythm it kind of does.

Since the song was made famous by a powerful female vocalist - Tracy Nelson - it was a smart production move to have another powerful female vocalist - Summer Kilgore Mendez - sing it. Between her lead and Marty on backup vocals, Summer nails this version of "Livin' The Blues".

"Whiskey Drinking Woman" and "Do You No Harm" are two tracks that are all about the guitars. With Darryl and Carveth in their usual rhythm groove behind them, these consecutive tracks feature a collection of phenome-



nal lead, slide, guitar box and rhythm guitar work by Marty Stokes and J P Soars.

All aboard the "Morning Train"..... next stop, church! This spiritual, Gospel track was pleasantly unexpected. Not being able to recall Marty ever doing this type of thing, I'm already looking forward to the next time he does. His acoustic guitar work is as moving as it is masterful and the harmony vocals between him and Summer are heavenly. Great track!

Other tracks on "Pick Up The Phone" include: "Sink Or Swim", "Low Flyer", "Pay My Dues", "Down Like A Man In Love", "Tumble", "I Found Love" and "Inside The Bottle".
